Why The Disability Union Works

We empower Disabled People to become champions for themselves and others by bringing them community, opportunity and unity.

Community

By bringing Disabled People together in our regular social events, online community and campaigns we help each other, make friends and make change together. Just some of our community projects include:

- Providing much-needed services that have taken a huge hit by government cuts
- •Hosting sensory play sessions involving music, movement, and stimulating the senses through play
- •Working with local visitor attractions to increase accessibility and inclusive practices
- •Working with businesses and organisations to promote and raise awareness of accessibility within our communities
- •Regular social groups and events for members online and in person



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Opportunity

We provide opportunities around employment, politics, sports and every other aspect of life including:

- •1:1 support from a caseworker on disability-related issues.
- •Disability Union Skills Academy 700+ online courses on everything from confidence to software development and beauty therapy.
- •Regular online or in person events focused on employability, inclusion in a workplace etc.
- •Our Disability and Democracy project that is helping Disabled People get into politics.



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Unity

Besides the right not to be discriminated against or bullied, fair treatment also includes dignity. This is why we are working alongside national health trusts to ensure Disabled People are treated with respect. Our recent projects include:

- Accessible play areas
- Accessible leisure centres
- Lobbying MPs regarding the neglect of Disabled People during the pandemic
- Changing Places toilets
- Accessible entry into the employment sector

Our Director's topped up the remaining funds needed for the year.

This is the total amount we have received from both annual and monthly memberships.

We used £8,970 of our Paul Hamlyn Foundation grant to hire our Strategic Development Officer, £1,000 from Little Lives, and £1,000 from Arnold Clark.

We received £10,000 from The National Lottery to fund our Sensory Superstars project.

We took part in the Government's Kickstart Scheme where we provided a job to 3 16-24 yearolds on Universal Credit for 6 months. Each Kickstarter had lived experience of being Disabled or a carer.





The casework department were covered by membership fees.

The community department and Sensory Superstars were funded solely through grants.

The Skills Academy was funded through membership fees.

Memberships include our website hosting and phoneline were covered by memberships. Business insurance and accountancy were covered by the Directors. Others were covered by grants.

Grant writing was funded by the directors.

Our Kickstarter wages were covered 100% by the Government Kickstart Grant.



2022 Achievements

Here are just some of the things we've accomplished this year:



Cuts Cut Chances

We organised our first-ever campaign 'Cuts Cut Chances' to raise awareness of and reverse Hampshire County Council cuts to SEN school transport. Our campaign included:

- Multiple media appearances on BBC and ITV
- An <u>in-person protest</u> outside the HCC headquarters in Winchester which enabled us to gain further talks with councillors and raise awareness of the issue through the media
- We had constructive engagement with the council and individual sympathetic councillors
- Through the pressure we applied through the media and general advocacy for parents, we managed to <u>get results for over dozens of parents</u> and children who were left without transport.

We hosted our <u>Disability & Democracy</u> webinar (watched by over 100 people), where we were joined by MPs, councillors, and trade unions to discuss how Disabled People can become more involved with politics and remove the barriers within the system to enable them to take part in local and national politics. We want to see Disabled People in parliament.

Political Work

We started our political lobbying work and have had <u>multiple meetings in Westminster</u> with MPs. George is now a <u>part of the All Party Parliamentary Group for Disability.</u>

We are now planning an exciting project for the second half of 2023 that will provide online coaching and educational support to train Disabled People to run for elected positions in the local government campaigns or other user-led groups. This will be a pilot study to create an ongoing mechanism of training Disabled People for political office.







Sensory Superstars



Tasha and Char have hosted an incredible 42 Sensory Superstar sessions around Gosport. The Disability Union is working towards ensuring a legacy that every child will have the right and ability to access play and education, and our Sensory Superstar sessions offer sensory play and opportunities for all children to explore, learn and develop, regardless of physical, mental, or cultural differences.

Casework

Our team of caseworkers have helped over 80 members with their disability-related issues. They have assisted with benefit applications, PIP appeals, legal referrals, reasonable adjustments in the workplace, provided well-being support, and more.

We were <u>featured in the news</u> multiple times, highlighting the most important <u>Disability-related</u> issues.









On our mission to help Disabled People get into work, <u>over 276 hours</u> were spent on our <u>Skills Academy</u>, and <u>64 courses were successfully completed</u>.



Manor Farm

We worked with <u>Manor Farm</u> (a farm in Southampton) who have now implemented:

- An incredible <u>accessible play area</u> both indoors and out
- Hands-on <u>sensory learning</u> with the animals
- A <u>sensory garden and classroom</u> where local SEN schools can visit
- Makaton throughout the farm





Open Day

To celebrate our partnership, we hosted an open day at Manor Farm to celebrate the hard work carried out by the farm to improve their accessibility. A diverse community came together to celebrate acceptance and inclusion for all.













Online Social Events

We hosted over <u>26 online social</u> <u>events</u> from <u>DIY adaptive</u> <u>clothing workshops to BSL</u> <u>classes and seated yoga</u>.
